Mr R J Macleod Memorial

At the end of last year Mr R J Macleod, affectionately known to pupils and colleagues alike as Barts, passed away after a short illness. RJ was very much a member of "The Nicolson Family," and although he retired in 1997 he always maintained an interest in the school and its pupils and staff. As the Assistant Rector for the senior school he took a personal interest in the future destinations of all his pupils and continued to follow pupils' progress long after they had left The Nicolson. On the surface, he was a formidable force, not to be trifled with, and he always kept the senior school in order. On a personal level, he would go out of his way for any one of the pupils in his care. He was a strong believer that young people should be treated fairly and often stood up for pupils (sometimes unbeknown to them) to ensure they were given the chances they deserved.



As both a former colleague and a teacher of many of the current staff, RJ will be fondly remembered and sorely missed. The values he exemplified of honesty, integrity, loyalty and service were passed on to those of us who remain here today and it is because of teachers like Roddy that many of us (who are now on the staff) became teachers too. Our thoughts continue to be with Roddy's widow Anna, his daughters Janet, Mairi and Alison, and his grandchildren Eve, Ellen, Gregor, Derek and Jane, all of whom were very proud of him.

Referendum Debate 2014

On Wednesday 12 February all S5 & 6 students got the opportunity to listen to a debate on Scotland's constitutional future. The S6 speakers were Scott Duncan & Krisell Macdonald (Yes) and Iain Boyd & Stuart Lamont (No). The speakers from the two campaigns were Alasdair Allan MSP (Yes Scotland) and Alasdair Morrison (Better Together). The debate was chaired by Aonghas Domhnallach from BBC Alba. After listening to the arguments on both sides the students were balloted on this question: Should Scotland be an independent country? This is a break down of the result:

1914 -1924 - North Lewis

Pupils at Sgoil Lionail are currently involved in a project in which they are researching the impact of the First World War on north Lewis from 1914 to 1924. Local historian, Iain G. Macdonald provided a very interesting and informative narrative to set the context for pupils and Annie Macsween from Comunn Eachdraidh Nis added a personal dimension to the account with information about how two of her uncles were killed in France and the devastating impact this had on the family. Seeing their actual 'death pennies' and hearing many other thought provoking anecdotes from Annie certainly made us all more aware of the terrible realities of WW1 for that generation although we can never really appreciate how awful it was.

Pupils will now use the wealth of artefacts, photographic and written sources in the Comunn Eachdraidh to produce presentations which will feature at the launch of the book about The Great War being produced by Comunn Eachdraidh Nis later this year.

As well as getting to know the history of their own area better and visiting local places of significance in terms of the war, pupils will perform songs and music from that era and develop skills such as research, presentation and filming and editing in the process.

It is also very pleasing to see pupils making good use of local archive material and resources for educational purposes. With any luck, such involvement may encourage pupils to become actively involved in preservation of their own heritage.

Asymmetric week

The school management team along with Transportation staff and members of the Education Department are currently in discussion with regards to the implementation of an asymmetric week next session. In general terms, this may mean slightly shorter lunch breaks, Monday to Thursday, with increased pupil / teacher contact time and a shorter school day on Friday. More detailed information will be circulated to parents and carers in the near future.

Hi FiReS

This is a ten week course offered to pupils in S3 and S4 and aims to enable pupils to:

- become members or leaders of a team
- improve self-discipline
- improve confidence & communication skills

The course provides a basic work experience programme including the essential elements of first aid, use of operational equipment such as hose and ladders and simulated fire incidents, all within a disciplined and controlled environment.

The purpose of the scheme is to provide training and development opportunities to young people in the Highlands & Islands, principally through Fire and Rescue Service related activities. It will encourage pupils to make the most of their physical and mental capabilities and to become more responsible, safer and caring members of their communities.
